How are restrictions affecting farmers' ability to operate? Jordan Lamb will provide an overview, specific details and implications on the new Implements of Husbandry, Senate Bill 509 (now 2013 Wisconsin Act 377). On April 23, 2014, Governor Scott Walker signed the Senate Bill into law. This legislation establishes new, less restrictive size and weight limitations for farm machinery known as "implements of husbandry" (IoH) and establishes a new category of farm machinery known as "agricultural commercial motor vehicles" (Ag CMV). Learn how, under the new law, IoH or Ag CMV vehicles will need to operate to stay in compliance with the new requirements.
