INCREASED PRODUCTIVITY, JOB SATISFACTION AND EMPLOYEE RETENTION can be positive benefits when non-Hispanic dairy owners/managers/middle-managers understand the cultural differences and take steps to bridge the communication gap between them and their Hispanic employees. An evening workshop, "Cross-Cultural Communication on the Dairy," on Wednesday, April 25, in Oshkosh will shed significant light on this topic.
